# O-SECTION ANNUAL MEETING REPORT for Friday, Nov.8, 2013

Thanks to the Hartland Winter Trails Association, we were again able to hold our meeting parallel to theirs at Damon Hall in Hartford.

After a shared lively social hour and wonderful potluck dinner, President *Inge Brown* welcomed about 50 "old" and some new section members. **Guests from GMC headquarters** were Dave Hardy, Director of Trail Programs, Maisie Howard, Director of Development, and Joe Sikowitz, Membership and Volunteer Coordinator.

**President** *Inge Brown* started the business meeting with a moment of silence for the three members who died in 2013: *Sue Bazaar, Paul Magoon,* and *Vic McGee*. She then recalled some of the O-Section's key events during the past year: Our experience with having adopters for the Appalachian Trail stretch from Killington to Norwich, rather than maintaining it on scheduled workdays. Inge also stressed how much quiet and little known work is done by the "trail angels", who leave goodies at trail intersections or even open their homes to AT through-hikers to spend a night. One of our president's special concerns is how to establish a "young adventurers club", to get more children out onto the trails.

The **Taylor Series** in April at the Montshire Museum attracted about 100 people. This slide show with the theme "Mt.McKinley, Now and 40 Years Ago" was a joint venture of our own octogenarian *Heinz Trebitz* and Norwich Teenager *Kristen Kelliher*.

**Secretary's report**: The minutes from the 2012 Annual Meeting, printed in the December Footnotes, were accepted without change.

**Treasurer** *Patty Spencer* presented her report with the following key figures for the fiscal year 2013:

Income \$ 2,474.- expenses \$ 3,734.- This negative balance is due to our contribution of \$ 2,000 to GMC headquarters to support the construction of the Long Trail footbridge across the Winooski River in the Bolton area. Opening balance \$ 4,700; closing balance \$ 3,440. The most recent count of voting members at 354 was slightly up from the previous year (328).

**Outings Coordinator** *Kathy Astrauckas* reported about more than 180 activities for the past year, led by two dozen dedicated volunteers. Hikes, road walks, cross-country ski trips, snowshoeing, social gatherings, paddling and bicycling were scheduled for all weekends and some weekdays. Kathy stressed that we try hard not to cancel any event. Even if conditions look unsuitable, leaders almost always have a "Plan B": a different destination, mode of travel, or both. When in doubt, call the leaders!

**Trails and Shelter Chairperson** *Lee Eastman* reported that we have switched from scheduled workdays to sending out small groups to help with special trouble spots like overgrown sections, fallen trees, or difficult stream crossings. Two years after hurricane Irene, all major bridge replacements are now complete, thanks to the cooperative work of the GMC and the National Forest Service. Included in our area are the Gulf Stream bridge at Rt.12, the Thundering Falls boardwalk, the Stony Brook bridge and a new bridge at Kent Pond. Most of the physical work has been done by private contractors. Lee also stressed how useful the chainsaw course, offered by GMC, turned out to be for him. **Newsletter Editor** *Inge Trebitz* reported that 28 of our members have elected to receive the *FOOTNOTES* as an e-version rather than printed.

Section Director Dick Ruben passed his report on to Dave Hardy, who updated us on the still not finished Winooski Bridge and the possible GMC acquisition of an old camp in the Bolton area. Dave also mentioned the AT improvement work done by a Boy Scout group on Totman Hill, and a group of sixth graders and their teacher from the Pomfret School on the Dana Hill stretch. He also mentioned the new steps up the bank from Pomfret/Woodstock road.

**Elections: Secretary** *Heinz Trebitz* pointed out how much we need younger people to step into the positions that all of the officers have held by now for a number of years.

## Vic McGee remembered

*Víc McGee*, 77, a member of the O-Section for twelve years, died on Oct.6, 2013 of prostate cancer.



Born and educated in KwaZulu Natal, South Africa, Vic's way to the Upper Valley went via Cambridge/England, Princeton and University of Illinois to Dartmouth College in 1969. His interests ranged widely from Mathematics to Geography, Educational Testing to Psychology, Sports to Travelling, and of course nature. When I mentioned that we might name one of the walks for him, he could not decide which one was his favorite - "Maybe the one on Wild Apple Road? Or when we started on Cloudland Road? I wish I could still send you an email!". And if he had, I am sure he would have signed it the way he always did, with a big CHEERS!

# YOUNG PEOPLE WORKING ON THE APPALACHIAN TRAIL

If you have ever hiked our section of the AT between Pomfret Road and Rt.12, you must remember Totman Hill, that sloping, water-logged field, where hikers sank into the mud up to their knees, and desperately tried to find a way around. Not anymore!

In spring of this year, a scout by the name of Graham Melville was looking for a trail to work on as his Eagle Scout project. When **Totman Hill** was suggested, it seemed to be an impossible piece of work. But in a joint effort between Green Mountain Club, Forest Service, Marsh-Billings-Rockefeller National Historical Park, and the Scouts (and their parents) it all came together.

On a weekend in August, Graham's scouts dug trenches, lugged boards and tools, and built a series of steps and boardwalks all the way up the hill. You can now walk up (almost) without getting your boots wet. It is not quite finished, but what an improvement!
