Wilderness-50 Outings 2014

This year is the 50th anniversary of the passage of the Wilderness Act. As part of the national celebration, more than a dozen outings have been scheduled for this summer in wilderness areas of Vermont and New Hampshire. Trip listings are marked as "Wilderness-50". The outings are planned jointly with GMC and Sierra Club in Vermont, and with AMC and Sierra Club in New Hampshire. They will be lead by O-Section member *Peter Hope*. MISSION ACCOMPLISHED?

The mission of the Green Mountain Club is to make the Vermont mountains play a larger part in the life of the people by protecting and maintaining the Long Trail System and fostering, through education, the stewardship of Vermont's hiking trails and mountains.

Our O-Section members, located mainly in and around the so-called Upper Valley, are far away from the Long Trail. In keeping with the trail maintenance part of the GMC's mission, our section has been assigned the responsibility for 45 miles of the Appalachian Trail, from Killington to the Connecticut River.

But what about the stewardship?

We have an abundance of great trails more or less in our backyards, many of them taken care of by other organizations. So we try to establish and maintain a good relationship with these other groups by having some members join them, helping with their trail work and planning trips in their bailiwicks.

A closer look at our outings schedule from past and present years shows these connections:

Snowshoe trip with the Ascutney Trails Association, Ski and combined annual meeting with the Hartland Ski Trails, Workday with the Rivendell Trails Association, Hike with a ranger from Marsh-Billings-Rockefeller National Park, Walks with the Upper Valley Land Trust, Hike with the founder of the Strafford Cross-Town Trail. Planned walk-through with people from the Crown Point Road Association Rambles with the Eastman hiking group

It is different kind of stewardship, but I think it fulfills the intent of the GMC mission.

Who are we? Founded in 1910, the Green Mountain Club was established "to make the mountains of Vermont play larger roles in the lives of people". To meet that goal, the club constructed the 272-mile Long Trail (LT). The GMC is responsible for developing policies and programs aimed at preservation, maintenance, and proper use of hiking trails for the benefit of the people of Vermont.

What is the Ottauquechee Section? Our section, one of 14 chapters of the GMC, is located in and around the Upper Valley. We schedule activities all year round for those who enjoy the outdoors, including hikes, bike trips, canoe outings, cross country skiing and snow shoe hikes. The "O" Section is responsible for the maintenance of 46 miles of Appalachian Trail (AT) between Maine Junction at Willard Pass near Killington and the Connecticut River at Norwich, VT, including four trail shelters.

If you wish to participate in our activities, meet friendly, outdoors loving people and contribute to the maintenance and quality of Vermont's hiking trail system, the Ottauquechee Section welcomes you.
