Minutes of the 43rd ANNUAL MEETING of the UPPER Valley OTTAUQUECHEE SECTION of the GREEN MOUNTAIN CLUB

Note: In view of potential COVID-19 infections, the meeting was held via ZOOM.

1. Welcome and Introduction

On October 29, 2021 UVO-Section Dick Andrews called the official meeting at 6:45 p.m., welcoming 17 members (including spouses and guests).

The Green Mountain Club staff was represented by Executive Director Mike DeBonis.

The ZOOM conference was hosted by Tom Kahl.

The Agenda, and officer/committee reports had been sent to the membership together with the e-mail invitation.

2. Announcements

Dick Andrews: In memoriam of *Harry Temple*, the US Forest service has created a new lookout and installed a signpost on the Weathersfield Trail on Mount Ascutney. *Harry* is remembered for his work on trails in the Weathersfield area, and as longtime Trails and Shelters Coordinator for the UVO Section.

3. Approval of 2020 Ann. Mtg. Minutes: The minutes as printed in the December 2020 FOOTNOTES and distributed before the meeting by e-mail, were approved unanimously.

4. Committee Reports (paraphrased – written reports are available through the Section secretary).

Outings: Here are some highlights and direct excerpts from *Kathy Astrauckas' report*: What another long, strange year it has been for UVO (and all GMC) outings! Winter outings were scrapped due to the pandemic; no group outings in spring – we recommended small, individual hikes instead. In about mid-May we got the go-ahead for resuming official group outings, so we scrambled, and I DO mean scrambled, to hurriedly cobble together a Summer schedule (July – August) in the hopes of getting it published and into your hands or email boxes before June 1. Basically, we had about 2

weeks to get it done, much shorter than our usual 1 – 2 months lead time. I think we missed that deadline by a few days, but *Heinz* sent out an email to those on his UVO email list, giving folks a heads-up that a full Summer Schedule would be forthcoming, and listing the first few outings that would take place before they received it.

We resumed in person planning meeting in July, but had to return to ZOOM in September. Planning for the Fall schedule was done by e-mail, a much harder job for the Outings Coordinator. Yet, the response from trip leaders was great, with many local trips offered. Many leaders opted to lead on Fridays or Mondays rather than on weekends, to avoid crowded trails and overflowing parking lots.

Our trip leaders are all volunteers, and our long list of outings would not be possible without them. In all, we muddled through the year but still had 19 brave souls who offered to lead! We owe them a big Thank You for helping us get safely outdoors!

Section Director: *Tom Kahl* first thanked UVO members who supported the GMC's Long Trail Day. We raised \$525 in donations, and six of us participated in a September 3rd Long Trail Day hike up Breadloaf Mountain and Skylight Pond. Overall, the GMC was able to raise over \$70,000 through Long Trail Day activities for the public phase. The campaign has now entered the public phase and has raised \$2.6M. The goal is to raise \$3M by the end of this year with another \$1M in planned gifts to reach the \$4M total goal.

FY21 ended (April 30, 2021) with a \$300K surplus that was used to pay off solar and publication loans and some funds were retained for cash flow. The August 2021 revenues were \$499K, which is 104% of the same period last year.

The GMC trails and shelters crew basically completed twice their annual amount of work, making up for projects that could not be done in 2020 because of the pandemic.

Treasury and Membership: *Iris Berezin* presented the key figures for fiscal year 2021 (numbers in brackets are for fiscal year 2020):

Membership: 313 (last year 305). Membership dues: \$1896 (2549). Total Revenue \$ 2041 (2904) ; Expenses \$ 2033 (1996); Cash Balance \$3971 (3962).

After explanations by the Treasurer, and ensuing discussions, the report was accepted as presented. It was noted (as in previous years) that revenue numbers are available only through the month of August. This is reflected in dues income much lower than the previous year. *Suggestion:* consider a rolling financial report covering the annual period from July 31 (previous) through August 31 (present).

Trails and Shelters: *Bob Hagen's* report acknowledged the work and cooperation of all partners involved in maintaining our trails and shelters. Fortunately, the UVO Section has a full complement of adopters who spent the season blazing, sawing, clearing water bars, clipping, hauling shavings, digging out firepits. Quote: "I've heard nothing but compliments about our work."

The number of volunteer reports increased this year, giving the stretch coordinators better information on needed maintenance. It will also help the main club document volunteer hours needed for grant writing.

This year the GMC staff Volunteer Coordinator and Education Director, *Lorne Currier*, held two trail maintenance work days with our section. The first covered the proper way to deal with water bars and other drainages. The second was on sidehilling - a technique that re-establishes an eroded tread. Volunteers used the new skills to relocate a piece of trail that parallels Route 12 in Woodstock. In addition to on-going maintenance, *Nick Krembs* scheduled three consecutive work days for significant maintenance from River Road north to Stony Brook Road. All projects were completed thanks to good member attendance.

Bob Hagen welcomed *Debbie Marcus* as our new stretch coordinator (Cloudland Rd. to Chateaugay Rd.), replacing *Heinz Trebitz* who had held this position for almost 20 years. He thanked *Heinz* for his continued service.

5. Recognitions: Special mention went to *Kathy Astrauckas* for keeping up the UVO outings program under the adverse conditions of the past two years. Thanks to *Tom Kahl* for setting up and hosting all UVO ZOOM meetings during the last year.

6. Election of Officers: *Annie Janeway*, Nominating Chair, presented the following slate of officers, which was accepted unanimously.

7. Comments from visitors: *Mike DeBonis* remarked on his participating in four GMC Section meetings during the last few months. He reported an increase in GMC membership and the continued rise of trail use in Vermont. The number of LT "end-to-enders" has doubled during 2021.

The GMC fundraising campaign (details in *Tom Kahl's* report) is in its last phase and will end in June 2022. Some of the money will be used for the replacement/renovation of the HQ office building.

Questions and Answers:

Heinz asked whether GMC has been evaluating its use of the facebook platform. Answer: not addressed at present.

The lack of chainsaw training and certification was discussed. *Bob* mentioned his contacts with *Game of Logging*. He suggested that the Club could ask *Game of Logging* to develop a course adapted to the limited needs by adopters in the field. *Mike* promised follow-up with GMC field staff.

Heinz raised the unresolved issue of the AT crossing with Rte. 12 in Woodstock and pleaded for an outreach by GMC to communicate with the property owners next to the crossing. *Mike* will follow up.

8. Old Business: *Debbie Marcus* reported on her adopter work at Wintturi shelter. The old privy needs to be replaced. Installation of a mouldering outhouse is planned for next year.

9. New Business: Members approved the following donations to fellow organizations in the Upper Valley: \$ 200 each to Hartland Winter Trails, Rivendell Trails, Upper Valley Trails Alliance and Upper Valley Land Trust.

10. Reflection on Outings: As so often in the past we asked how to attract younger people to our outings. We noted the communication shift from land lines to cellphones and e-mail. Should we list e-mail addresses for all outings leaders?

11. Adjournment: The meeting was closed at 8 p.m.



AN INVITATION TO JOIN THE GREEN MOUNTAIN CLUB

Who are we? Founded in 1910, the Green Mountain Club was established "to make the Vermont mountains play a larger part in the lives of people". To meet that goal, the club constructed the 272-mile Long Trail (LT). The GMC is responsible for developing policies and programs aimed at preservation, maintenance, and proper use of hiking trails for the benefit of the people of Vermont.

What is the Upper Valley Ottauquechee Section? Our section, one of 14 chapters of the GMC, is located in and around the Upper Valley. We schedule activities all year round for those who enjoy the outdoors, including hikes, bike trips, canoe outings, cross country skiing and snow shoe hikes. The "O" Section is responsible for the maintenance of 46 miles of Appalachian Trail (AT) between Maine Junction at Willard Pass near Killington and the Connecticut River at Norwich, VT, including four trail shelters.
