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Minutes of the 45th ANNUAL MEETING of the UPPER Valley OTTAUQUECHEE SECTION of the GREEN MOUNTAIN CLUB

1. Welcome and Introduction

On November 3, 2023, at a new location at the Community Hall in Thetford Center, this was the first Annual meeting to be held in person again.

UVO-Section President *Dick Andrews* called the official meeting at 5:30 p.m. (social hour), welcoming 27 members and asking for personal introductions.

2. Announcements

Tom McCleary reminded the members of the upcoming, Nov. 4 hike on the Sunapee-Ragged-Kearsarge Greenway.

Lynne Miller presented a plan for a four-day summer stay at Great Camp Sagamore in the Adirondacks next August. More information will be posted in the FOOTNOTES and on the UVO website.

3. Recognitions:

Kathy Astrauckas was presented with a T-shirt (purple, of course, showing white blazes), and an official ATC trail marker. This was to celebrate the completion of her section thru hike of the Appalachian Trail over many, many years. *)

- **4. Approval of 2022 Ann. Mtg. Minutes:** The minutes as printed in the December 2022 FOOTNOTES were approved unanimously.
- **5. Committee Reports** (highlights only written reports are available through the Section Secretary).

Outings: Kathy Astrauckas - The UVO Section has been busy with our usual jam-packed outings schedule this past year. We listed over 200 activities from November 2022 through October 2023.

This included:

- hikes, road walks, bike rides, paddling
- X-C skiing, snowshoeing, micro spiking
- trail maintenance (those are listed as our "work days")
- a series of 7 A.T. hikes in collaboration with Marsh-Billings-Rockefeller National Historical Park Rangers
- a "Forest Immersion" hike by new member and leader *Amanda Kenyon*
- Patrick O'Neill's 5-day trip to Baxter State park. Six people took part; 4 UVO members climbed the mighty Katahdin, including the challenging Knife Edge.

We have had between 3 and 5 outings per week led by 20 volunteer section members. Our outings range from very easy and slow-paced walks to more strenuous hikes to summits.

UVO's large number and wide variety of outings are the envy of many other GMC sections. Other sections often ask me how "I" do it. The credit is of course all due to our 20 volunteer leaders. Thank you all for your time and effort!

Trails and Shelters: Bob Hagen - As covered in previous editions of Footnotes, the Section's 46 miles of AT survived the heavy rain storms in good shape. Adopters and small crews were able to get out in April and May, and their work on water bars and blowdowns helped to lessen the damage from the July rainstorms.

The trail was never closed, although Thundering Falls and the boardwalk required some attention. A big hole around the northern abutment of the Route 12 bridge needs to be refilled.

The USFS has taken over responsibility for keeping open areas cleared, a service much appreciated by the adopters and the trail users.

Students from the Rutland Career and Technology Center have adopted the trail segment from Kent Pond to Sherburne Pass. We're still looking for an adopter for Thundering Falls and the boardwalk. Another project we'll need help with is the relocation of the AT just south of Thistle Hill shelter. The plan is to put in a switchback to replace the failing stone staircase.

Adopters are still out checking segments as part of their fall work, but the heart of the field season was framed by a GMC led work day in May and a second one in September. These sessions were designed for members new to trail work and for veterans who had some knowledge of trail maintenance but wanted to gain new experience and techniques.

There's no substitute for you, our dedicated volunteers. During your hikes, take note of places you think could use the help of an experienced crew and let me know. We'll be building a maintenance calendar for the spring.

Thanks to all who participated in trail and shelter activities this season!

Treasury and Membership: Iris Berezin - Key figures for fiscal year 2023: Revenue \$ 2721; Expenses \$ 2679; Opening Balance \$ 5070, Closing Balance \$ 5305. Membership: 344 (active and lapsed; last year 351). Because of duplicate reporting of dues for October 2022, the revenue for fiscal 2023 is overstated. As noted by Iris, we actually collected \$ 600 less in dues in 2023 compared to 2022, which is partly reflected in our reduced membership numbers. The report was accepted as presented, although the question was raised whether synchronizing the UVO fiscal year with that of the Main Club would help making the financial report more transparent.

Section Director: According to *Tom Kahl* the GMC approved the 2023-2028 strategic plan including:

- Protecting and maintaining trail resources
- Operational excellence
- Prioritizing people resources.

Also approved were a Code of Conduct (volunteers' rights and responsibilities) and a Strategic Conservation Plan.

accomplishments were the 2023 trail projects, discussions about Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (DEI), and a collection of \$ 69,000 in donations for the Long Trail Day. UVO-Woodchuck members contributed \$ 1,118.

Publicity: *Inge Trebitz*: The bulk (approx. 180) of our FOOTNOTES is still being sent as printed copy; some 50 members are receiving the newsletter via e-mail. Printing and mailing of the FOOTNOTES amounts to a annual cost of \$ 865.

Heinz reported on the UVO Website. It is up-to-date except for the Hiking and Trail Work page which still needs improved trail maps for our section of the AT. The question was raised who would continue to manage the website in case of personal changes. Heinz pointed out that there is an alternate webmaster with full access to the site. It was recommended to document the website processes to facilitate a seamless continuation of website services.

Kathy Astrauckas suggested more advertising for our outings at local list serves (e.g. Upper Valley).

6. Election of Officers: Heinz Trebitz, on behalf of Annie Janeway, Nominating Chair, presented the following slate of officers, which was accepted unanimously.

- **8. New Business:** Members approved the following donations to fellow organizations in the Upper Valley and GMC HQ: \$ 200 each to Hartland Winter Trails, Rivendell Trails, Upper Valley Trails Alliance and Upper Valley Land Trust; \$ 500 to GMC. *Iris* noted the positive response from Rivendell regarding present and future trail maintenance plans.
- **9. Adjournment:** The meeting was closed at 8:30 p.m.


