Minutes of the 46th ANNUAL MEETING of the UPPER Valley OTTAUQUECHEE SECTION of the GREEN MOUNTAIN CLUB

Welcome and Introduction

After a lively social hour and wonderful potluck dinner, UVO-Section President *Dick Andrews* welcomed 24 attendees and asked for personal introductions.

Announcements

Debbie Marcus, the adopter for the Wintturi Shelter, announced the completion of the composting privy there. This replaced the last remaining pit privy in the GMC-overseen Appalachian Trail and Long Trail systems. There will be a work event on Nov. 7th to stain the new structure with a GMC staff person onsite. *Debbie* is looking for a couple of people to help.

Approval of 2023 Annual Meeting Minutes: The minutes as printed in the December 2023 FOOTNOTES were approved unanimously.

Committee Reports (highlights only – written reports are available through the Section Secretary)

Outings: *Kathy Astrauckas* - The UVO Section has been busy this past year, as usual, with a full schedule of outings. We listed 186 activities from November 2023 through October 2024. These included:

Hikes, road walks, both dirt and paved. This category represents by far the most frequent of our outings, and includes some special types, such as wildflower hikes, hike-and-bike outings, and hike-and-swim excursions.

Snowshoeing, microspiking, cross country skiing, bike riding, paddling.

Trail maintenance. Those are scheduled as "workdays;" there are many more unofficial work outings undertaken as necessary. Nowadays, the need is great in all seasons.

Three social events: New Year's Eve party, Mud Season Social, and—this year—a big birthday party.

Four quarterly planning and business meetings.

A multi-day adventure at Great Camp Sagamore in the Adirondacks.

Three to four outings per week have been led by twenty volunteer members. Our outings range from very easy and slow-paced walks to more strenuous hikes to high and steep summits.

I salute all the leaders for their enthusiasm in leading and in choosing such a wide variety of enjoyable venues. Thank you all for your time and effort!

Treasury and Membership: *Iris Berezin* – Key figures for October 2023 to September 2024: Revenue \$2836 (last year \$2721); Expenses \$3994; Opening Balance \$5305; Closing Balance \$4147. Membership: 303 (active and lapsed; last year 344). Although the membership numbers are down from last year, revenue is stronger. The biggest impact on the bottom line was the expense of supporting the two members who took the chain saw training course. The importance and value of chain saw training was discussed by the group. The checkbook balance is about \$1158 less than last year at about the same time. *Iris* reported that her reaching out individually to lapsed members to remind them about renewing dues does yield some positive response.

Section Director: *Tom Kahl* (presented by *Dick Andrews*) – Nineteen donations (for a combined \$2,141) were made on behalf of the UVO Woodchuck Team on Long Trail Day; this was the third highest GMC Team of the total \$60,012 raised.

To preclude a projected fiscal year (May 1, 2024 through April 30, 2025) deficit, the Club trimmed 5% from the operating budget. This required reduction of two full-time equivalent positions: restructuring of the Membership Coordinator position and the vacant Development Coordinator position into a single new position, and elimination of the Operations Manager position.

The Board has a working group that is beginning to review GMC's governance.

There was some discussion surrounding the issue of whether to continue the Club practice of electing a Board member to represent each Section. Concerns should be conveyed to our representative. There will be a spring retreat with a professional consultant for the Board members to review such matters as the Board structure.

The following projects were completed: the three-year rehabilitation of the Burrows Trail on Camel's Hump, the new Forest City Trail Bridge, the Bromley Mountain Tower, the move of the Minerva Hinchey Shelter and privy from private to public land, and an assessment of the 2024 flooding. The new GMC headquarters Visitor Center is scheduled to be done by the end of this year.

Trails and Shelters: *Bob Hagen* - All segments of our section of the Appalachian Trail, and all shelters on it, have adopters. Students from the Rutland Technical Center maintain the segment from Kent Pond south to the Sherburne Pass Trail. Pairs or individual adopters take care of the rest of our forty-five miles of trail and our four shelters.

This fall *Patrick O'Neil* and *Tom McCleary* completed their sawyer training which certifies them to use chain saws on federally owned land.

Of note were two successful trail construction projects: the relocation of a 500-foot portion of trail south of Thistle Hill Shelter, and replacement and repair of puncheon south of the Quechee-West Hartford Road (with wood donated by Morton Trails). Our work was supervised by *Lorne Currier* and *Kate Songer*, two knowledgeable members of the GMC field staff who work with and train section volunteers.

Another puncheon project in the Totman Road area is under consideration. The Vermont Youth Conservation Corp will spend three weeks rehabbing the Quimby Mountain segment of the trail.

We are fortunate to be able to borrow special tools from the Upper Valley Trails Alliance's Lending Tool Shed, and to receive their advice on trail projects.

GMC staff has been spending time in area schools, getting students interested in trail work, and we now have business cards with a QR code to give people we meet on the trail. The QR code connects the user to the GMC website, which has a variety of options, including a donation opportunity.

I enjoyed the chances to work and hike together, and I look forward to joining all of you as we continue to build on our accomplishments.

Publicity: *Inge Trebitz*: For the fall FOOTNOTES edition, 190 addresses received a printed copy and 50 addresses received an e-version. The quarterly publication currently costs \$1.17 total per mailed copy (printing, and postage stamps at 73 cents each).

Heinz reported that the website page "Hiking and Trail Work" now contains an interactive map for the Appalachian Trail in Vermont (courtesy of the

Appalachian Trail Conservancy and GMC) showing trailhead parking and other features.

Heinz expressed concerns about website maintenance over time. Suggestions were made along the lines of hiring (perhaps through a listserv) a younger person who is passionate about web design work. It was pointed out that web design is not the problem. Rather, we should be looking for a section member interested in web contents that reflect the values of the younger UVO generation. This is an important topic for consideration; please send feedback to *Heinz*.

New Business: It was voted unanimously to change the text of our bylaws, so that our Section Annual Meeting will now be scheduled in spring instead of fall, to match the schedule of the other Club Sections. So, our next Annual Meeting will be in March or April 2025.

Members approved the following donations to fellow organizations in the Upper Valley and GMC HQ: \$200 each to Hartland Winter Trails, Rivendell Trails Association, Upper Valley Trails Alliance and Upper Valley Land Trust; \$500 to GMC.
